

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## HAPPY BIRTHDAY, MARYCREST!

One hundred years ago, on February 27, 1923, Mother Mary Teresa Tallon purchased the Carey Estate – all 120 acres – in Monroe, NY, so that the fledgling Community, founded in 1920, would have a novitiate in which to train its members according to the decrees of the Church.

After looking at ten available properties, Mother chose this one, eleven hundred feet above sea level, so God's praises would ring out many times daily from the highest point! She chose the name "Marycrest" in honor of Our Lady, Patroness of the Parish Visitors of Mary Immaculate.

In his homily on July 19, 1923, when the Chapel and Novitiate were dedicated, His Eminence, Patrick Cardinal Hayes said, "I was very much moved during the dedication services and at Holy Mass. Our Lord is going to abide in this house. It is a Tabernacle where He will live among His children to give His love to all who come in contact with Him.

"Here, the novices and others will be inspired; they will receive that light which God alone can give. They will be touched with that fire that can come only from God. Here, they will be inspired with love and ideals that most persons do not understand, something beyond the human mind's grasp, as high above nature as Heaven is above the earth, with a power that will enable them to do all things right."

### **The Angelus**

The Angel of the Lord declared to Mary:

And she conceived of the Holy Spirit.

Hail Mary,...

Behold the handmaid of the Lord:

Be it done unto me according to Thy word.

Hail Mary...

And the Word was made Flesh:

And dwelt among us.

Hail Mary...

Let us pray:

Pour forth, we beseech Thee, O Lord, Thy grace into our hearts; that we, to whom the incarnation of Christ, Thy Son, was made known by the message of an angel, may by His Passion and Cross be brought to the glory of His Resurrection, through the same Christ Our Lord.

Each day for one hundred years, the Angelus bell has signaled the time to recite the Angelus salutation three times a day – of course, except when ice has frozen it to silence - ringing out the joys of Profession days and the somber toll of funeral processions. It has rung to announce the death of a pope and the election of his successor.

Mother encouraged Sisters to come to Marycrest for time away from the City to be refreshed and renewed in the beauty here.

Each summer, busloads of Associates from our various mission convents would come for their annual Pilgrimage and be treated to a talk by Mother Mary Teresa, visiting with the Sisters, offering raffles, and refreshments. Mother Mary Teresa never failed to take photos with each group. We continued this tradition until Covid hit, and the number of Associates has dwindled.

Marycrest's welcoming doors are wide-open for visitors from all over the USA – priests, religious, and laity.

Priests find our rectory very cozy and our grounds perfect for a meditative walk. Religious Sisters enjoy the peace and beauty that refreshes spirits.

Visitors often speak of the "peace" of Marycrest and join us for Mass and prayers. So many people call to give us their prayer requests which we post on the prayer board in the Chapel.

The appearance of the grounds has changed over the years. Still, the enduring legacy of our Foundress has never waivered: a home where Sisters are steeped in the spiritual foundations of our contemplative-missionary charism. It remains a place of prayer for those eager to know His love and enter into His Heart, a haven for those needing spiritual consolation and healing conversation. Marycrest is a place of peace and refreshment for all who allow themselves to be embraced by its spirit!

## Reflections

Marycrest is dear to us in many ways. Our Foundress chose it out of several available properties – 120 acres. Mother's relationship with the original artist/owner is a testament to our charism, as she made every effort to

bring him to know and love the Lord. "Jesus and the Apostles on the Sea of Galilee" is the only religious painting we know of among his works. He painted it for the Community:

Almost everyone who comes to Marycrest says, "It is so peaceful here!"

On our retreat days, when we walk on our grounds, we are lifted to the Lord, sensing His presence everywhere. A walk to the cemetery brings to mind all of the saintly Sisters we have lived with. From them, we learned the spirit of our contemplative-missionary vocation.

The five dedicated priests buried here inspire other memories. I am thinking of our former chaplain Father John Mary Groves, who used to make three holy hours before the Blessed Sacrament each day. At the end of every Mass, he would recite the prayer known as the "Nunc dimittis." He died on February 2, 1963, the feast of the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple. In the Gospel for that feast, Simeon prays, "Nunc dimittis – now Master, you can dismiss your servant in peace."


# MARYCREST GOD'S HOUSE, MARY'S HILL, AND OUR HOME




Children from home-schooling families came for activities with the Sisters and to offer help cleaning the Chapel for Christmas and Easter.


Religious Sisters from other Congregations joined our Sisters in formation for classes in our Mary, Mother of the Church Institute, taught by noted priests and Sisters.


Mother Mary Teresa Tallon determined that the site chosen for the future novitiate must be one that would provide the opportunity for the contemplation of nature at its best.

She received an advertisement for a most desirable property in Monroe, NY. It was known as "Vinterholm Castle" – also the Carey Estate. After many prayers and meetings, Mother knew she had chosen the perfect spot and immediately changed the name to "Marycrest."

This beautiful property of one hundred and twenty acres, located fifty miles north of New York City, where our first Convent was, had a large stone building with eighteen rooms, steam-heat, and

electric lighting. One can command an excellent view on all sides from its third-floor balcony. The water comes from an artesian well on the grounds. There was also a garage, a stable, and a farmhouse nestled within bountiful woodlands.




# TOUR OF MARYCREST




The sign at the Entrance welcomes you.



Once you turn onto "Marycrest Road," you enter a lovely tree-lined drive that curves around for about three-quarters of a mile. In every season of the year, its beauty doesn't disappoint. After taking the left fork, the road gently rises until it begins to crest.




St. Joseph, our patron and protector, will be the first to greet you on the left







The first building on the left is Visitation Hall, which was added in 1976 to provide more bedrooms. Visitation joins Tallon Terrace, our infirmary wing. We originally built it in the 1960s as a Juniorate. The statue of St. Therese is outside these buildings, pictured here with Sr. Theresa Marie. Unseen from the front is another wing named Good Shepherd. Sister Rita Mairelenes saw the need for office space and more bedrooms in the 1980s



The Chapel of the Immaculate Conception is at the top of the Hill, built in 1942. Servant of God Mother Mary Teresa Tallon planned every detail of the Chapel, from the choice of stained glass windows to the statues. Here the Sisters come for daily Mass and morning and evening prayer together. They adore Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament during their holy hour each day. In this beautiful place of worship, they profess their vows and celebrate their jubilees.





We move then to the original building, the Motherhouse. Built in 1905 by its first owner, artist Ferdinand Pinney Earle, and later owned by John Carey, it became home to the Parish Visitors of Mary Immaculate in 1923. A statue of

the Sacred Heart of the Good Shepherd replaced an urn in what we have called Rosary Circle.

Mother Mary Teresa used to give conferences to the Sisters in this foyer. The original Chapel was in this building in what is now the family room.







Behind the Motherhouse is the Rectory. It rises on the rock foundation of the original owner's "patio."



St. Joseph's Novitiate is next. Mother Mary Teresa permitted Father Guinivan to build a "bungalow" on the property, pictured below. When he died, we added a second floor. Set off from the main house, the Novices truly have an ideal home to learn our contemplative-missionary way of life.






A side road takes us into the woods, where we will find a statue of the Pieta near a Mausoleum. Before the cemetery was developed, the deceased Sisters were buried there.

Rejoining the main road, we pass the garages, cottage, and Quonset hut. The road now leads us to the cemetery.

Whether we are praying the Stations of the Cross or remembering our deceased Sisters, Our Lady of the Assumption cemetery is a revered place at Marycrest.







"When we consider the meaning of the Holy Mass and realize that it is an offering of God-Incarnate, the Second Person of the Holy Trinity, to His Father, and that this Mass is ours, we would wonder that there is anything wrong in the world, because of the value and influence of this Sacrifice. The Holy Mass is so great that it is enough to make millions of worlds right and undo all the wrong, and yet at the present time, as in the past, great outrages are being enacted against the true Church of God.


"We know that certain revolutionists have caused the ruin of vast countries, immense countries whose inhabitants were almost uncountable. We know, too, that these same radicals worked destruction on our mainland in a neighboring country; that officers of the law entered the most prominent churches, arrested the priests at the altars, and dispersed the congregations; and when the people resisted them they called out the militia to shoot or the firemen to turn the hose on the people. We may wonder how this could have happened when we think of the power of God in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. But we must know that the very meaning of the Holy Mass itself gives the answer. The victim offered in the Holy Mass, Our Lord Jesus Christ, was Himself done to death in His own country and by His own people. We know, too, that if He had not suffered this crucifixion patiently and willingly, and even lovingly, we would have no Mass at all...

"We might think it very desirable to have been present on Calvary; we might imagine we could have obtained anything we wanted for God and souls if we had stood at the foot of the Cross or been present even as was the good thief. But we have the Holy Mass, and if we cannot always be actually present, we can be there in spirit. Hence, the value of the liturgy, especially the prayers of the Church officially prepared for Holy Mass. We should make much of these lessons and prayers and dwell upon them, one after the other, in reverent reflection and loving appreciation."



"In the offering of the Holy Mass it is the Body and Blood of Jesus-Eucharistic that is lifted up to God. Jesus is interceding with the Father. The thought of the Holy Eucharist ought to be with us all day. We ought to humbly beg Our Lord's pardon that we are not more like Him. Jesus is always absorbed in God, always devoted. He gave us that wonderful Gift with His Heart overflowing with love on the night of His Passion..."
